Dutch emission Authority

- Competent authority emission trading CO₂ , N₂O and NO_x :
 1. Validation and permits
 2. Registry of CO₂ and NO_x
 3. Enforcement
 4. Policy advise
 5. Capacity building
 6. Information and training

Two tracks approach

2011:

- The legislation 2011 is almost ready
- Temporary biofuels overview (spreadsheets)
- Spreadsheets will be published by the ministry

2013

- The **automated** register biofuels is still under construction;
- Register operational: the 1th of January 2013
- Changes in the legislation?

Learning by doing

- 2011 compliance assistance:
 1. To assist the operators for compliance RED and FQD
 2. To improve the quality of the practice and legislation
 3. To create transparency and confidence
- 2013 full swing:
 1. Register will be operational
 2. Certification schemes in the market
 3. Clear insight into the market
 4. Enforcement based on risk assessment

Transition year 2011

- A minimum amount of the total delivery of petrol, diesel and biofuels to the market contains **sustainable** biofuels
- Minimum of 2011: **4,25%** (energy based)
- Submit each 3 months a "biofuels overview" to the NEa
- Moment of RED compliance 2011: 29th February 2012

Sustainability of biofuels 2011

- Options to accept schemes:
 1. Proof of assessment by EC
 2. Proof of acceptance by MS (and quick scan)
 3. Acceptance by Dutch ministry
- Sustainability requirement in 2011:
 - First half 2011: statement by the economical operator of using schemes
 - Second half of 2011: statement by an independent auditor
- Dutch assessment protocol for voluntary sustainability schemes for biofuels

Who has the obligations?

1. Importers and producers of biofuels
2. Blenders of fuels and biofuels
3. Suppliers of fuels to the transport sector
4. Opt in operators:
 - Suppliers of biogas to the transport sector
 - Suppliers of electricity to the transport sector
- all close to excise warehouse
